Louise's group have made wonderful progress and they are all managing to put their heads under the water for a few seconds at a time. Toes are busy, but sometimes bottoms are sagging. So, we need to try and be confident to look down so our bottoms come up.

Teresa's Y3 group has been focusing on stamina. They have been kicking on their backs and fronts and all of the group have managed 25m without stopping. Over the next few weeks we will be returning to widths so we can improve our coordination of arms and legs whilst maintaining our body balance to breath at regular intervals.

Teresa's Y4 group have still been focusing on their back crawl as well. Everyone is swimming lengths of the pool with more confidence. Some are still needing to take breathing breaks on their front, but everyone has managed at least one length of kicking non-stop on their backs.

Trish's Y3 group have been focusing on stamina on their fronts. Long reaching arms and slowing each cycle down so we have time to breath under our arm, not out in front of us. A tricky transition, but you will get there Year 3.

Trish's Y4 group have been reinforcing equal balance between legs. It is slow progress, because it is tricky to feel whether you are kicking rhythmically or not. You have to be very disciplined and slow right down! Well done though, most of you are focusing more on your technique than racing. It isn't easy when you have a competitive spirit, but it will pay off when you enhance your strokes.

Congratulations to Rhys (who swam for the first time in the big pool), Bailey, Ruby, Bea, Skye and Isla for being super stars over the past two weeks.

I love visiting the South of France. My favourite area is the Dordogne Valley. I have been here several times and I have even canoed down the Dordogne River!


