YI Present Their Ideas to the Parish Council



Earlier this term, Year I walked to Playing Place to explore the local area. As part of their walk, they visited Playing Place play park. History detectives

On Monday 9 October, year 3 and 4 went to Kea church to be history detectives. They found out that there was an old church, but the roof started to fall in. So the vicar knocked it down and Kea church was built in 1896.

They found a window dedicated to Arthur Sowell, who died in the First World War when he was 21 years old. His dad was the vicar and he fitted the window.

The children met a man called Mr Aver, who was a headmaster and he pretended to be a Victorian school inspector. They went into the old classroom and did spellings, times tables and arithmetic.

They also found the oldest grave in the churchyard which was from 1805.
