

Handwriting	<p>At school we are having a big focus on using all the joins learned so far in all of our writing- phonics, spellings, literacy, humanities, maths etc.. Use your work from last week to describe the whale. Use your adjectives to show how the kind, happy whale becomes a sad, stranded whale.• Write two adjectives next to some of your pictures ready for a 2A sentence.• Now you are going to choose one of your speech sentences from last week that fits one of the pictures on your story map, or you can make up one new speech sentence and write it on the story map next to one of the pictures. Remember to use inverted commas for speech and say who is speaking and how they are speaking eg “Quickly, spray the whale!” yelled the firefighters. Or “Good-bye and good luck!” shouted the children from the shore.• Now retell the story including your starter, sentence openers, adjectives and your speech sentence.
